At Ward End we promote an anti-discrimination message, through our curriculum and additional activities such as assemblies, enrichment activities and celebrations throughout the year. Our Rights Respecting Schools Gold Award embeds these values in daily school life and gives children the best chance to lead happy, healthy lives and to be responsible, active citizens.

Overview of SMSC

Social – citizenship, community involvement, social responsibility, tackling issues like bullying, diversity and equality.

Health – physical health, nutrition, exercise, mental health awareness and coping strategies.

Economic – budgeting, saving, debt awareness, understanding economic wellbeing and sustainability.
